An initiative of the Global China Lab, *Global China Pulse (GCP)* is an open access biannual publication that focuses on China's international engagements in their various manifestations. The project stems from *The People's Map of Global China* (thepeoplesmap.net), an online map in which nongovernmental organisations, journalists, trade unions, and academics come together to provide up-to-date information on various dimensions of Global China in their localities. Alongside the informational infrastructure the *Map* provides, *GCP* offers a new space to publish content in a variety of styles and, possibly, experiment with different approaches and formats. *GCP* rests on two pillars: the conviction that today more than ever it is necessary to bridge the gap between the scholarly community, civil society, and the general public; and the related belief that open access is necessary to ethically reappropriate academic research from commercial publishers who restrict the free circulation of ideas.
